Description

Analysis and writing in contrapuntal forms with emphasis on the style of J.S. Bach

Learning Objectives

Students will learn how to:

- Read musical scores in a wide variety of formats and textures
- Critically interpret a diverse array of contrapuntal Western art music from the 16th-18th centuries
- Analyze eighteenth-century tonal counterpoint
- Write (compose/transcribe/arrange/improvise) music based on tonal counterpoint
- Analyze contrapuntal devices, techniques, schemas, forms, etc.

Required Textbook

Robert Gauldin, *A Practical Approach to 18th Century Counterpoint* (Long Grove, IL: Waveland Press, 2013/1995).

Course Requirements

Daily use of the course Blackboard page and website to access course materials. Weekly reading, homework, score study, listening, and analysis. There will be two exams (50 min.) and two projects (*Analysis Project* and *Writing Project*). See the *Reading and Assessment Schedule* for due dates.
